St James the Less RC Primary School PE Grant Statement

St James the Less places a high priority on ensuring all our pupils have a rich experience of physical education at varies times of the day.

We pride ourselves on providing many opportunities for our children to be involved in a wide range of physical activities. Some of these are competitive and some are collaborative. It is our aim to ensure that all pupils have had an opportunity to represent their school in inter-schools' events. We believe that children should be well-prepared for these events and have a great reputation for good preparation which gives children the confidence to excel. However, we demand that our children are exceptional ambassadors to themselves, their school and the event they attend. Participation is very important but only if we give the best version of ourselves. Winning and losing with good grace is very important. Our children learn core values during their physical activities which align with the school mission statement.

We share in the vision of the DfE: - For all pupils leaving primary school to be physically literate and with the knowledge, skills and motivation necessary to equip them for a healthy, active lifestyle and lifelong participation in physical activity and sport.

Physical Education at St James the Less covers a very broad area and is not confined to a typical "PE lesson". Our approaches are to ensure children are motivated at different times of the school day, including before and after school, during lunchtimes and breaktimes, and through different curriculum approaches. We also tailor our curriculum to take advantage of excellent school grounds and exceptional local facilities e.g. ski-slope.

The remainder of this document is to provide statutory information about how St James the Less uses the Sports Premium Grant. The document illustrates how St James the Less spends well beyond the sports grant allocation.
